An intensive 2-week Winter School at The Hebrew University of Jerusalem providing a comprehensive and up-to-date introduction to the methodology of linguistic fieldwork.

PROGRAM

Intensive courses (7-11 Feb. 2016)

- Data management for language documentation (**Jeff Good**)
 - audio and video recording, annotation, lexical databases, project management and archiving
 - ethical considerations in corpus design
- Working with a speaker (**Sebastian Fedden**)
 - designing a study, elicitation methods, transcription and translation of elicited texts
- Phonetics and phonology in the field (Heriberto Avelino)
 - case studies of theory-driven fieldwork
- Challenges and methods in syntactic fieldwork (Heather Bliss)
 - case studies of theory-driven fieldwork

Practicum (optional, 14-18 Feb. 2016)

Participants may receive additional course credit by carrying out a small fieldwork project under the mentorship of local faculty. The project will involve working with a speaker, applying the techniques of fieldwork research to investigate a particular linguistic phenomenon of interest. The practicum week will also include a <u>day trip</u> to selected communities in which language documentation and revitalization efforts are underway.

Topics, in **any sub-field** of linguistic theory, will be defined by the students in consultation with their mentors. We also encourage projects that explore the effect of **contact between languages** (Arabic-Hebrew, Russian-Hebrew, Yiddish-Hebrew, etc.) as well as projects investigating **heritage languages** spoken in Israel.
